History of Dudley No 1 Canal

1775 Lord Dudley promoted the building of a Canal from Dudley to Stourton . Robert Whitworth was commissioned to survey the route.


1776 April, Act of Parliament passed.

1778 £16,200 raised.

1779 First short link built from Dudley to join the canal from Stourbridge to the river Severn.

1785 Act of Parliament passed for the Dudley tunnel link.

1792 June, Dudley Tunnel completed to link the Stourbridge canal to the Birmingham Canal

History of Dudley No 2 Canal

1792 The owners of the Dudley No1 canal planned an extension of the Canal via Netherton to Selly Oak forming a new Southern route to supply goods and coal to London. Agreement reached in August.

1793 Parliament approved the plan which received Royal Assent, a company was established with £90,000 authorised capital raised.

1794 early work started with Josiah Clowes as engineer and William Underhill as resident engineer.1796 The original £90,000 spent and a further £40,000 raised.

1798 May, work completed and the 11 miles Dudley No2 canal was opened to provide a bypass to avoid canal congestion and charges in central Birmingham.

The Leasowes Valley was crossed by a famous 18 meter high embankment.

The high ground of Woodgate watershed was crossed by a 2.2 mile tunnel, one of the longest in the UK.

Hawne Basin of Coombeswood Trust

1801 First of many tunnel collapses.

1841, the superintendent of the canal, Thomas Brewin, devised a very successful scheme which used a steam pumping engine and stop locks at either end of the tunnel to create a flow to speed up traffic.

1846 The moderately successful canal became part of the Birmingham Canal Network

Decline of the Lapal link of Dudley No 2 Canal

1917 there was a serious tunnel collapse, it was not reopened

1926 Eastern section from Hawne Basin to the Selly Oak canal was formally closed

1953 the 5.5 mile eastern section was abandoned

Restoration of the Lapal Link

1990 the Lapal Canal Trust was formed to restore the canal

1997 Dudley council restored the Leasowes Section **2007** the canal trust commissioned Atkins to produce a feasibility study

2008 Sainsbury's submitted a plan to the city council for a new shopping centre with restoration of the first section of the canal included in the plan
2009 Birmingham Council reconstructed the Harborne Lane Canal Bridge





Atkins - Feasibility Study

Recommended to use an alternative route through Woodgate valley

Route would be cost effective and make greater use of the Woodgate Valley for the wider community of anglers, walkers, cyclists, canoeists as well as boaters. Canal could include a new marina and help to rejuvenate the heritage sites of Weoley Castle and St Mary's Abbey in Halesowen

Restoration to be done in stages, with estimated total cost of around £60m

On completion the canal will be a significant magnet to attract people, so new cafes and canal side restaurants could be expected within what is essentially an urban area Proposal to include a Marina in the California area, converting an unused area into a revenue earning facility
